

Nathan Thornton was on the cash register, while Eileen Tatton was greeting the members. New president Don Bonner started the meeting and asked Doug Lum to do the Invocation. Doug did impromptu invocation by praising to good weather for a great fishing trip.

Terry Rogers extended our welcome to two guests: Tim McGrath and Harry Stephan. The visiting Rotaract members from VIU were Kyle and Anand, who is an international student from India. Sergeant Denise Davidson allocated tables for breakfast.

Bill Brendon did his rotary minute by appreciating Rotary. He said the true test of life comes during the busiest time of your life. By joining the Rotary, you get to prove it all the time.

President Don announced about the change in schedule. As a result, Ken Hammer was asked to talk about his projects and work in the International sector. Previous night's five clubs meeting on world community service (WCS) was held at Ken's home. At the meeting, all five clubs pledged their contribution. Downtown will contribute \$6000, whereas Oceanside will do 20%. Lantzville will support \$7000 for the fund. The committee is focusing on making some strategic plans so that it can make the best use of the fund.

Ken gave some insights about the Ghana projects, which includes setting up libraries and building clean latrines for children in four schools. Bev Hilton is very active on the projects and in managing funds allocation, which is as big as \$100K.

Ken is planning on sending a team next spring to attend district conference and to inspect the projects to make sure that all is running well. He wants to meet with local community members and members of the Sunyani club. He is looking forward to extending further help and to recognise the good work they have been doing. He mentioned that it would cost around \$3000 per person to travel to Ghana. The trip will consist of Rotary work and cultural experience in local communities. There will be a safari walk and visiting the village where slavery was originated.

He mentioned that city of Nanaimo has entered into an agreement to recognised city of Sunyani as a friendship city.

Duncan Rotary club is sending a dental team to Nepal next spring. Ken mentioned that San Mahara had suggested making an exploratory trip to Nepal so that we can get first hand info as what specific projects we can take on depending on the local needs.

Pat mentioned about Bolivia projects on Optometry, lead by Dr. Paul Geneau from North club. It was mentioned that Mid Island Group, MIG, consisting of 20 clubs is an active collaboration of Rotary in action. It supports various projects of common interest to its member clubs. Projects such as "Malaria net" is a good example of how the Rotary leverages its funds. The seed money from each club gets bigger by multifold at the end as the matching grant concept is applied in every level of the rotary organisation from community to district to foundation.

Kyle mentioned about his participation in a project called 'milk for babies' in Ghana. The Rotaract club is active in fundraising through different activities such as bake sales. They split the pot in two halves. One half goes to local programmes like First Nations and another half is utilized in the club activities. He mentioned that, on July 24th, they have beer and burger at the Queens for \$15. There will be a local band playing. One half of the fund will go to Loaves and Fishes and another half will be utilized in clubs activities.

Kyle mentioned about his club, where they have 10-20 members join for the meeting. The core group is comprised of 10 members. The club is very strong and active on FB. They have a policy to fine a member for not showing up and for not bringing a friend along at least once a month.

Patrick reminded that 3 years ago Jacklyn from Oak Bay club came to promote Guatemala projects and how he and other members from our club got involved. With the help of MIG and the other 4 clubs, they have been doing a lots of projects. He *...continued on next page!*
